BMW CHAMPIONSHIP RECAP

WILMINGTON, Del. — The Western Open was first played in 1899, which makes it the third-oldest tournament on the PGA Tour behind the British Open (1860) and U.S. Open (1895). Before Bobby Jones created Augusta National and the Masters became the Masters, the Western, which was played in Chicago, was even considered by many or most to be a major. Of course it hasn't been called the Western since 2006, when it became the BMW Championship.

Now, it's the second leg of the three-event Fed Ex Cup playoffs. And this August it came to Wilmington Country Club, which became the first course in the state of Delaware to host a PGA tournament, after stops at Aronimink in suburban Philly in 2018 and Caves Valley near Baltimore in 2021.

In all that time, there haven't been many repeat champions. And none in nearly three decades. Here's the list: Alex Smith in 1905 and '06, Willie Anderson in 2008-09, James Barnes (1917-19, there was no tourney in '18 due to World War I), Walter Hagen (1926-27), Ralph Guldahl (1936-38), Sam Snead

(1949-50), Billy Casper (1965-66), Jack Nicklaus (1967-68) and Nick Price (1993-94). Obviously there's a lot of very impressive names on that list. And now you can finally add one more.

A year ago, Patrick Cantlay outlasted Bryson DeChambeau in an epic six-hole playoff in which he made every putt he looked at. This time, it wasn't nearly as dramatic. But it counted just as much. After catching a nice break on the 17th hole when his tee shot bounced over a fairway bunker and put him in position to make a birdie to take the lead, all he needed at the final hole was a two-putt par from about 30 feet that he almost made anyway. Instead he was left with a tap-in for a one-stroke victory over Scott Stallings, who was going for his first win since 2014 but simply couldn't make enough makable putts on the closing nine. It happens.

Both Cantlay and Stallings shot 2-under par in the final round. Cantlay finished at 14-under 270. Xander Schauffele was next, two more behind, tied with Scottie Scheffler.

"Every time I've tried to defend, I don't think I've been able to do it, but it's definitely something that you circle on your calendar as something you want to do," Cantlay said. "These golf courses, like I said, reminded me a lot of each other, and I was glad not to go six holes in a playoff again."

On the 72nd hole, he did find a fairway bunker with his driver. But

it didn't prove to be any problem.

"It was not the spot I wanted to be," he said. "I had about 160 to the hole and I tried to slice an 8-iron as hard as I could and went to about where I thought I could get it, and it was one of the best shots I hit all week.

"I thought for sure hitting it on that line (on 17), it would for sure be in a bunker. Got an excellent break. Maybe one of the best breaks I've gotten coming down the stretch. And when you get a break like that you need to pay it off, and fortu-



nately I did."

Cantlay was played all four rounds with Schauffele, a friend, who had beaten him recently at the Travelers Championship when they were also paired together at the end.

"I'm glad to return the favor," Cantlay smiled. "It's always fun being with Xander. I think we fed off each other. We both played really well, and it's obviously a really comfortable pairing for both of us."

They also played two practice rounds earlier in the week.

"It's nice to spend time with one of my best buddies out there," he acknowledged.

Especially when you get the trophy.

Ironically, Xander missed a putt on the last hole that would have moved Cantlay up to the top spot in the Fed Ex Cup standings, which would have given him a two-stroke lead to begin the next week's Tour Championship, which he had also won in 2022. As it was he wound up starting two in back of Scheffler, the guy to beat for Player of the Year.

As it was, Cantlay became the first person to ever successfully defend a title in the 16-year history of the playoffs. He had missed a few shortish putts on Saturday, which is not his style. On Sunday those balls were dropping in the cup. Or at least enough of them. It makes a difference.

"It was a different type of feeling tournament than last year," he said. "Last year the fans were so loud and raucous, and then that arena coming down the stretch, and obviously I was behind playing the last few holes, which felt a lot different than playing with a one-shot lead on the last hole.

"But drawing on past experience is definitely something I've talked about. And I'll try to do that next week as well."

Cantlay would have to settle for a tie for seventh in Atlanta, three spots and two shots behind Schauffele. Neverthless, his next bigstage moment will be the Presidents Cup in late September, where he and Schauffele are among the guys American captain Davis Love is counting on to lead the United States team when it takes on the rest of the world minus Europe at Quail Hollow in North Carolina.

"I think I'm very competitive," Cantlay said. "And I always have been. It definitely grinds my gears if I don't win, and I'll do everything I possibly can to win.

"(Losing at the Travelers) stung. That's nothing you want to do ever. I've had a bunch of close Sundays this year and not all of them have gone my way, as opposed to last year at the end of the year where I felt like all of the Sundays went my way.

"I think it just drives you to practice a little harder. I've been playing

great golf all year, so I knew if I just kept knocking on the door and kept staying in a positive frame of mind and trusting myself that I'd knock off a few victories."

The Tour has already announced that it is returning to Caves Valley in 2026, the same year that Aronimink is hosting the PGA Championship that it never got to host in 1993. So it would seem there's a decent chance the BMW could be coming back to the first state at some point in the not-to-distant future too.

"I think it's great," Cantlay said. "We saw how excited the fans were this week. They were amazing. This golf course provided great theatre, especially coming into the last hole where it's that amphitheater feel.

"They were cheering me the whole way, and I had a bunch of friends and family out here, so it was just a great feel and great energy."

And it all worked out. But not before he dropped to two off of the lead after making a bogey at 10.

"My head wasn't even there," he explained. "I tried to stay as in the moment as possible. Obviously from 120 yards I was pretty pissed to have made bogey from the middle of the fairway, on what you think would be a birdie hole. The wind kind of fooled me.

"But the story of the week for me was when I made bogey, I birdied the next hole quite a few times. Being able to bounce back like that make that putt for birdie on 11 was really key for me, to get the momentum (back) on your side ... I do my best to try and remove my ego from the equation as much as possible.

"I didn't get ahead of myself at all. You're not going to close the deal every time. You have to be cognizant of that going in. Once you accept that's a reality, I think it makes it a lot easier to play as free as possible coming down the stretch."

Cantlay was the Player of the Year in 2021. Some guys have trouble keeping it going the year after. That obviously hasn't been the case.

GLEN OAK CAPTURES COAL SCUTTLE TROPHY



WILKES-BARRE, Pa. — Glen Oak Country Club snapped Wyoming Valley Country Club's GAP/AGA Men's Coal Scuttle winning streak Sunday.

Glen Oak registered a 6-over-par 578 total for an eight-stroke victory over Wyoming Valley (par 71, 6,153 yards), which, as defending champion, hosted the final round of the event's 72nd edition. Wyoming Valley previously won the last seven Men's Coal Scuttle titles.

David Mecca led the Glen Oak team with a 3-under-par 140. That score put Mecca in a four-way tie for individual medalist honors. Berwick Golf Club's Corey Bierly, Wyoming Valley's Eric Plisko and Honesdale Golf Club's Eric Williams also finished at 140. Williams, the GAP/AGA Men's Player of the Year leader, prevailed on the fourth playoff hole (No. 1, par 5, 475 yards).

Joining Mecca on the Glen Oak team were Kyle Williams (143), James Egan (145), Kevin Karabin (151) and Luke Fayocavitz (153). The low four of five scores count toward the team total.

This marks Glen Oak's second Scuttle victory (1989).

"We haven't been competitive for many years. Going in, I thought there were a lot of good teams, but I thought we had a chance," Williams, 30, of Clarks Summit, Pa., said. "We had a lot of people back at Glen Oak that were texting us and wishing us good luck in between rounds. It's going to be really special for the club to see us win this. It will create more interest for golf. Everyone's going to be pumped up."

Glen Oak certainly felt energized following its performance at Huntsville Golf Club (par 72, 6,755 yards) Saturday. It led Berwick and Huntsville by six strokes.

An early charge by Wyoming Valley threatened to upend Glen Oak's leaderboard status. But both Mecca and Williams dug their figurative toes into the sand. The former, playing two groups ahead of Mecca, rattled off three consecutive birdies to reestablish Glen Oak's position. He hit a gap wedge 125 yards to four feet on No. 9 (par 4, 379 yards), a wedge 70 yards to three feet on No. 10 (par 4, 278 yards) and an 8-iron 175 yards to 18 feet on the par 5, 509-yard 11th hole. Williams, however, bogeyed his final two holes: a loose drive on No. 17 (par 4, 398 yards), a pulled wedge from 80 yards on No. 18 (par 4, 354 yards).

"I was a little nervous. I hadn't checked the scores, so I was hoping that wasn't going to cost us. It didn't," Williams said.

Mecca, who joined Glen Oak earlier this year, made sure of it. He inked three

birdies on his inward nine. Mecca executed a flop shot to six feet on No. 12 (par 5, 536 yards). He drained a slippery 27-footer following a crisp 7-iron on No. 15 (par 3, 190 yards). A wedge from 80 yards to six feet on No. 17 (par 4, 398 yards) moved Mecca to 4 under. Too much backspin on a sand wedge on No. 18 (par 4, 354 yards), however, led to a bogey.

No matter. The team title was Mecca's mission.

"Dave Maddock was our head of golf. He put together a solid team," Mecca, 29, of Scranton, Pa., said. "There are a lot of good players at Glen Oak. I'm proud to represent them."

"Over the last three or four years, we've been building up kind of a younger group. This year, the kicker was Dave joining the club. He's up there with the best amateur players in this area," Williams added. "You knew, coming into this event, that even if we had a guy or two play shaky, he was going to play under par."

The Glen Oak team followed Mecca throughout the sudden-death playoff for individual medalist honors. They encouraged. They reassured. They supported the new guy, regardless of individual result.

"I think Dave's the best player in the area. I caddied for Dave in U.S. Amateur Qualifying at Rolling Green (Golf Club), and he was the first alternate there," Karabin, 28, of West Chester, Pa., said. "Great player, great guy and a positive addition to the club."

Karabin made the trip from West Chester to compete on Glen Oak's behalf. He may return to the club to celebrate with his teammates.

"I definitely am [going back]. I'll definitely convince a couple of the guys," Williams said. "Kevin lives in West Chester, so I don't know if I can convince him. I know Luke, Jamie and probably Dave will be there too. We'll enjoy this one for sure."

By virtue of its victory, Glen Oak will serve as a Men's Coal Scuttle host site in 2023.

Established in conjunction with the AGA's founding in 1951, the Men's Coal Scuttle Championship is a cornerstone event in which clubs compete against one another to determine regional supremacy.

"I've played a lot of golf in the last couple of months, maybe the most golf I've played in a couple-month stretch since I came back (from an injury) in '17, and I feel good," Cantlay said. "That is testament to the hard work I've put in with my team to get there.

"I'll have to say my team is really solid. Every person to a man is working as hard as they can to achieve the same goal. And I'm very lucky to have people that not only are on my team but are good friends. I spent a lot of time with them traveling, and a lot of times we'll stay in the same houses together on the road. I couldn't do what I do without them. They definitely make me better each and every day."

That's all fine. And important. But ultimately there's only one guy who has to go out there and pull the trigger. And he's shown he can do it. And not just once or twice.

"The thing I always remind myself when I finish second or if I'm close is Jack Nicklaus had more seconds in majors (19) than he had wins (18)," Cantlay offered. "That stat will shock you, considering he has the most majors ever. No one would ever say he couldn't close, or wilted under pressure, and yet he had more second places than anybody else.

"With that being said, I think putting yourself in position is maybe the one thing that you can control in golf. You can't always control what other people around you do or where you get the right bounce or the wrong bounce. But putting yourself in contention time after time after time, the bounces are going to go your way and you'll get your fair share of wins."

Even when it's something no one else has been able to do in awhile. Or in the case of the Fed Ex at all.

"I expect (Tiger Woods) to have almost every record, so it's kind of surprising even he (hasn't done it before)," Cantlay said. "It's surprising he's never defended (in one of these).

"But I think with it being a year-long race, it's a difficult goal to achieve because it's not just one tournament. You have to put yourself in position for the whole year, and then that (particular) week you have to perform as well."

Having one up on Tiger can never be a bad thing. Neither can putting your name right up there alongside the likes of the Sneads and Nicklauses and Hagens and Andersons of the all-time food chain. Because history is a defining thing. For what it's worth, next year the BMW is headed back to Olympia Fields in Chicago, where Jon Rahm won in 2020 and Cantlay tied for 12th. A lot can happen in a year, but if nothing else that should give him something else to focus on. And maybe rectify. Yo, nobody's threepeated since the late 30s. Go for it.





HUNTSVILLE CAPTURES SENIOR COAL SCUTTLE



EXETER, Pa. — Bill Lydick joined Fox Hill Country Club earlier this year. The relationship remains in a honeymoon phase, if Wednesday is any indication.

At Fox Hill (par 71, 6,268 yards), Lydick, representing his first home in Huntsville Golf Club, carded a 1-under-par 70 to earn individual medalist honors in the 40th GAP/AGA Senior Coal Scuttle Championship. His performance led Huntsville to victory in the treasured team event. Huntsville filed a 17-over-par 301 to prevail by a stroke over two-time defending champion Fox Hill.

The low four of five scores count toward the team total. George Steinmetz (73), Marty Wilbur (78), Santo Lafoca (80) and Matt Cuddy (81) rounded out the Huntsville contingent.

Huntsville previously won the Senior Coal Scuttle Championship in 2018. As a result of its victory, Huntsville earns the right to host next year's affair.

"We don't know how many more opportunities we'll get at this," Lydick, 60, of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., said. "I felt pretty good. I had two good rounds last week at Huntsville. I shot 71-73. I took off Monday and only played nine holes Tuesday, so I felt I was ready for today."

Lydick's start suggested otherwise. He bogeyed two of his first three holes: a missed green on No. 2 (par 4, 416 yards), a three putt from 12 feet on No. 3 (par 3, 186 yards).

"From there, I never missed another green, and I made three birdies," Lydick said.

Yes indeed. All courtesy of a clutch 50-degree wedge, too. He hit it from 117 yards to four feet on No. 5 (par 4, 393 yards), 104 yards to 20 feet on No. 8 (par 4, 397 yards) and 108 yards to four inches on No. 16 (par 4, 354 yards).

That newfound Fox Hill familiarity helped, right?

"Yes. However, I have eight rounds at Fox Hill this year, but that's enough here," Lydick said.

Like Lydick, Steinmetz added a second club home that proved advantageous Wednesday. He joined Huntsville a year ago (Steinmetz spent 1994-2004 there as well). He immediately found camaraderie.

"I enjoy the guys at Huntsville," Steinmetz, 61, of Malvern, Pa., said. "I played in their senior club championship and men's club championship, and they asked me to be a part of the team. I jumped at the chance."

Steinmetz, whose first home is Spring Ford Country Club, spent the past two days competing in the 71st GAP/DSGA Senior Amateur at Wild Quail Golf & Country Club. He finished in 12th place.

Wild Quail, by the way, is some 200 miles from Fox Hill. A lot of driving for man driven to help Huntsville strike Scuttle gold.

"This is awesome," Steinmetz said once the victory became official.

"What an upset this was," Lydick added. "A couple of nobodies from Dallas, Pa. My mantra at Huntsville is I'm the worst player at the club."

The best player for the club Wednesday.

BUTLER ROLLS TO MID-AM TITLE AT SCRANTON





CLARKS SUMMIT, Pa. - The Mid-Am lifestyle is an adjustment for golfers who have played throughout their teenage years and through collegiate golf, as there's a need for a work/golf balance once they hit the magic number of 25 years of age. Huntingdon Valley Country Club's Andy Butler personified that this week at the Country Club of Scranton, as he sat on his first round lead and put a half-day work shift in before shooting a second round 73 to finish at 138 (-6) and win the 29th Pennsylvania Middle-Amateur Championship, presented by DICK'S Sporting Goods.

With a 1 p.m. tee time on Tuesday, Butler didn't come to the course early to let his mind dwell on the three-shot lead he had entering the final round of the championship.

"I worked from 8 until 12 today," said Butler. "Got a nice little half day of work in and then switched my mind over to golf at that point."

Whatever he did, it worked, as Butler cruised to a three-shot win for his first PAGA championship. After parring the first three holes, he really broke things open with an eagle on the 4th, a 514-yard par 5.

Butler's drive on No. 4 found the left rough, and from 248 yards out, he hit a 3-hybrid that tracked with the flag but ended up about 10 feet short. He rolled in the eagle putt from there to give himself even more separation from the field.

He made a couple of what he termed "good" bogeys on No. 5 and No. 7. Then, protecting his lead, he played solid golf the rest of the way, with all pars up until a bogey on the 36th and final hole of the championship.

"I just wanted to start from scratch today and play a solid round of golf," said the 26-year old Butler. "I figured if I did, I probably wasn't going to be caught."

After getting through the front 9 at even par, the end was in sight.

"I was really kind of grinding at that point," said Butler. "I just wanted to keep making pars and moving on to the next hole."

When it was all said and done, that was plenty good enough for Butler to win at one of the most celebrated tracks in the Commonwealth.

Three shots behind Butler at 141 (-3) was former Pennsylvania Amateur champ Michael Brown, Jr., who fired rounds of 71-70. In third place was local standout John Barone of Glenmaura National Golf Club. Barone and Brown were the only golfers under par in both rounds, as Barone shot 71-71 to finish at 2-under par.

Tied for fourth were PAGA Individual Member Cody Cox and Blue Bell Country Club's Daniel Oh at even par. Defending champ Tug Maude finished in a tie for sixth place at 2-over par 146.

STIMMEL, OSBORNE TAKE ART WALL TITLES



CAMP HILL, Pa. - Rick Stimmel was the only golfer under par in both rounds at West Shore Country Club in the 18th Art Wall Jr. Memorial Championship, and he used a final round score of 69 (-3) to hold off Clay Davidson to win the championship, which was presented by DICK'S Sporting Goods. The win was Stimmel's fourth in a Pennsylvania Golf Association crown in his illustrious career.

Stimmel's two-round total of 5-under par 139 gave him the win in the overall division (ages 40-64) as well as the Senior Division.

"This caps off what I think is a pretty decent year," said Stimmel, of Diamond Run Golf Club. "I was glad to play well this week and sneak a victory in."

To do so, Stimmel had to hold off first round leader Davidson, a longtime member of West Shore who shot 3-under par on Monday. Davidson began Tuesday's round with birdies on No. 3 and No. 4 to extend his lead.

"Clay kept saying how fast the greens normally were, but I couldn't stop leaving putts short," Stimmel said of his front nine. "I couldn't get anything to the hole."

Stimmel's rally began on the 333-yard eighth hole, where he drove the green and two-putted for a birdie. After Davidson bogeyed the ninth, they were tied heading to the back side. But it was on the par-5 12th that Stimmel pulled ahead for good.

"I had a downhill, sidehill lie from 250 yards and hit 3-wood to about six feet," said Stimmel. "And I made a nice downhill putt from there."

That finally put him in the lead in the championship, but Davidson proved to be a tough competitor.

"He got himself up and down from tough spots three times out there today," Stimmel said.

After a self-described "sloppy" bogey on the 17th, Stimmel and Davidson, playing together in the final group, moved to the 36th and last hole of the championship with Stimmel up by two shots.

There, Stimmel safely hit the green with a nice approach shot, leaving him plenty of margin for error on the par-3 closer and he safely two-putted for the championship.

"I was fortunate to sneak one out. Clay is a really nice player," Stimmel remarked.

Jeff Daniels of Country Club of Harrisburg finished in third place overall at even par 144, with Dan Brown of Manada Golf Club in fourth at 1-over par and Lancaster Country Club's John Barry in fifth at 2-over par. Davidson did capture the Championship Division (40-54 years of age) while finishing second overall.

In the Super-Senior Division, Gregory Osborne of Overlook Golf Course bookended a fantastic season in the PAGA ranks with a two-round score of 144 (E) to edge out Don Donatoni and add the Art Wall crown to his season-opening win in the Dressler Memorial Championship at Berkshire Country Club.

"I don't know what to say," said Osborne. "I really had no expectations coming in here."

The key was the dialed-in approach shots for Osborne, who had four birdies in Tuesday's second round, and none longer than three feet.

"It was a crazy start," Osborne said. "I hit it to inside a foot on the first hole."


After that tap-in for birdie, he hit it close again on No. 3 and No. 4. He dropped back a bit with a double bogey on the fifth hole and then bogeys on No. 6 and No. 11, but on No. 12, another fantastic approach left him with another short birdie.

"My playing partner laughed after I hit it close on No. 4 out of the bunker," said Osborne. "It was just one of those days."

Osborne withstood a late bogey on the 17th to finish with a second round score of 73 (+1) to win by three shots over Donatoni. Brian Rothaus of Five Ponds Golf Club came in third in the division with a score of 148 (+4). Lancaster Country Club's Dan Burton was fourth at 6-over par and Frank Polizzi of Whitemarsh Valley Country Club finished fifth at 151 (+7).



BRIAN BERGSTOL, PGA, CAPTURES 101ST PHILADELPHIA PGA PROFESSIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP; EARNS BERTH IN 2023 PGA



Wilmington, Del. (August 31, 2022) — Brian Bergstol, PGA, of Shawnee Inn & Golf Resort in Shawnee on the Delaware, Pennsylvania, winner of the 101st Philadelphia PGA Professional Championship at DuPont Country Club and Concord Country Club, will lead 14 Section PGA Professionals to compete in the 2023 PGA Professional Championship, April 30 – May 3, at Twin Warriors and Santa Ana Pueblo Golf Clubs in Santa Ana Pueblo, New Mexico. The championship is presented by Cadillac, Club Car and Rolex.

Bergstol made five birdies and three bogies in his final round at DuPont Country Club on Wednesday, finishing with rounds of 66-69-69–204, topping the leaderboard at 9-under-par for a two-stroke victory over Braden Shattuck, PGA, of Rolling Green Golf Club in Springfield, Pennsylvania.

"It was stressful out there today," Bergstol said of his final round. "I'm glad it's over, but I'm very happy to be walking away with the [William B. Packer] Trophy."

Bergstol's assessment of the final round was accurate, as there were many lead changes, particularly on the final nine holes. At one point, the 36-hole leader, Zac Oakley, PGA, of Bidermann Golf Club in Wilmington, Delaware, reached 10-under-par, and was five strokes clear of Bergstol. However, the eventual champion remained patient, made two quick birdies on hole Nos. 8 and 9, and holed out for a par four on No. 10, after having to take a stroke-and-distance penalty from the tee following his first drive.

"That's when things started to change," Bergstol continued.

Although he made one last bogey on No. 11 to fall one behind Oakley, he quickly followed with birdies on Nos. 13, 15, and 18, the last one to clinch his victory.

Bergstol went on to thank his wife Megan, and children Brendan and Beau, in addition to Shawnee, TaylorMade Golf, TravisMathew, and his fellow PGA Members.

"I really want to thank the other PGA Professionals out here," he said. "They helped me get across the finish line to earn my PGA Membership, which allowed me to be eligible for this championship."

Bergstol was elected to PGA Membership on August 1 of this year.

Shattuck, who was also making his first appearance in a Philadelphia PGA Professional Championship, made sure to make things interesting by firing a 5-under-par 66, which tied the low round of the championship.

In addition to having his name engraved on the William B. Packer Trophy, Bergstol earned \$9,000 for his win, coming from the \$72,000 purse.







CHECK OFF ANOTHER BUCKET LIST DESTINATION CIRCLING RAVEN GC, COEUR D'ALENE, IDAHO

People have many varied and interesting "bucket list" activities planned in their lifetimes. They might include:

- Jumping from an airplane, putting all their faith in a parachute.
- Running with the bulls in Spain.
- Climbing Mt. Everest.
- Driving a race car at white-knuckle speeds.

Those are all a bit too dangerous for me.

Instead, my "bucket list" activity includes playing golf in spectacular and, sometimes, little-known locations. In the past they have included U.S. sites such as Shinnecock, on the tip of Long Island; Sand Hollow, on the edge of Zion National Park in Utah; Manaqua CC, in northernmost Wisconsin and Quintero, hidden in the desert canyons of Arizona about an hour north of Scottsdale.

Internationally, the list is led by exotic sites, such as: Playa Grande, in a remote region of the north coast of the Dominican Republic; Durban CC, hard on the Indian Ocean in South Africa; Golf D'Amelkis in Marrakesh, Morocco and The Abaco Club in the Out Islands of the Bahamas.

Although the latest bucket list golf destination is not what you might call exotic, it is in a state in which I had never played golf – Idaho.

Many people have seen photos of the resort course along the lake in the center of the town of Coeur d'Alene – the one with the gimmicky floating green. But the real jewel of the state of Idaho sits a few miles outside of town in the Coeur d'Alene Indian Nation.

Circling Raven Golf Course is the No.1-ranked golf course in Idaho. And deservedly so. It is 620 acres of natural scenic beauty and architecturally pure golf challenge. A round of golf at Circling Raven is unforgettable in many ways.

The course was designed by Gene Bates, who has a number of Western United States courses to his credit, and it opened in 2003. It can stretch to 7,189 yards from the back tees but has a number of shorter tees to accommodate all golfers. The slope from the back tees of 144 attests to the fact that there are plenty of thrills throughout the layout.

For additional thrills, there is the modern resort hotel – built in two stages – with its attached casino. The Mountain Lodge, with its rustic western theme, was the first to come along. The newer Spa Tower fuses a modern vibe with an elegant cozy atmosphere and, of course,




a luxurious spa.

"This entire project was a long time in the planning and it took a lot of foresight," says Coeur d'Alene Resort CEO Laura Penney. "Bringing visitors to the middle of this unspoiled natural piece of property was not easy. We knew we were taking a big risk. But, piece-by-piece, we built it ... expanded it ... improved it ... and now we believe we have something that is really special."

Aside from the casino action, the hotels attract big-name entertainment. Also, the restaurant offerings run the entire range from casual sports bar fare, to fine dining in the Chinook Restaurant Crafted by Chef Adam Hegsted.

"We want people to come here and feel as if they have left the hustle and bustle of the real world behind," explains Penney. "They can do that during the day on our golf course and they can do that at night in the hotels and casino. Once our guests get here, there is no reason to leave."

FOR THE FIRST TIME IN JUST OVER A QUARTER CENTURY, THE KORN FERRY TOUR IS COMING TO NEW JERSEY.

For the first time in just over a quarter century, the Korn Ferry Tour is coming to New Jersey.

Next August (17-20), Metedeconk National Club will host the

inaugural Magnit Championship. The last time the Triple A affiliate of the PGA Tour came to the state was 1997, when it was called the Nike Tour and the Laurel Creek Classic was held in South Jersey. For all you trivial pursuit fans out there, and you know who you are, that event was won by Matt Gogel, a six-time Korn Ferry champion.

Metedeconk is located in the Pinelands in Jackson Township, not far from Great Adventure amusement park, and is considered to be part of the Met Golf Association, even though it might actually be closer to the Philadelphia market than New York. Which only means it should be able to appeal to and draw from both areas. Nothing wrong with that.

In case you haven't been paying attention, roughly 80 percent of the guys on the PGA Tour have played at the Korn Ferry level. Some of those names include Scottie Scheffler and Xander Schauffele. So that's not bad. And that's just for starters.

Each year, the top 30 players from the Korn Ferry earn their PGA cards. This will be 72-hole event featuring 156 players. It will be the 22nd of 26 events for the season, the the last one in which players can qualify for the Korn Ferry playoffs.

Magnit, which was previously known as Pro Unlimited until just recently, is a global player in contingent workforce management. The deal is for four years.

Magnit ambassador Denny McCarthy is a two-time Korn Ferry graduate, in 2017 and '18. Since retaining his card by winning the Korn Ferry Tour championship, he's made four consecutive FedEx Cup playoff appearances.

"It's been an amazing journey," he said. "Magnit is important to me because I look for those organizations who demonstrate an unwavering to excellence within their space. As players, we pride ourselves on that same commitment to winning and dedication to the sport ... I wish everyone the best."

The purse will be worth \$1 million.

"There was a tremendous opportunity here, and it's incredibly exciting," said Korn Ferry Tour president Alex Baldwin, the first female to lead one of the PGA Tour's global tours, and who is also now overseeing the PGA's international tours. "It's a new chapter,



for us and the club. Just an upward trajectory with amazing momentum that we're seeing in our sport.

"We're seeing a continuous steady impact (of this tour). The talent and depth of talent, it's incredible. Literally the difference in terms of what separates the Korn Ferry Tour from the PGA Tour is just a razor thin line.

"The competitive caliber keeps getting younger. At the Presidents Cup, 19 of the 24 participants came from the Korn Ferry Tour. And you had recent graduates with Cam

Young, native of Scarborough, New York, just up the road, Taylor Pendrith and Mito Pereira (who nearly won the PGA Championship in May). Those three were playing with us one year ago. Again, the opportunities are endless."

In other words, there's a decent chance you will be seeing some future stars in these parts next summer.

A spot on the schedule became available because the PGA Tour, for the first time in 11 years, will be playing all of its 2024 events in that calendar year. That allowed the Korn Ferry to expand into October. Hence, they were able to add tournaments, with more breaks.

"Our mission, I talk about it all the time, is to identify, prepare and transition the next generation of PGA Tour stars while positively impacting fans, partners and communities worldwide," Baldwin stressed. "We are all part of this family, in helping them learn, be challenged and grow. And in doing so, it's not just what happens inside the (gallery) ropes. It's also about how we are impacting the community around us, how we are truly making the world a better place.

"I thank (Meteteconk) for welcoming us, and we'll see tremendous results."





We would like to extend a very big "Thank You" to all of our members who lent us their time and helped us to pull off several fun Member events this season.






